## When We Invest, We Succeed


- 1990 K-12 Education
  - Ranked 48<sup>th</sup> in Nation
  - Unconstitutional school funding
- Kentucky Education Reform Act
  - Raised \$1B for education
  - SEEK formula helped close the gap between districts
- Now
  - Ranked 29<sup>th</sup> in the Nation (2016)
  - #1 in nation low income to high income graduation rate gap (2013)



## K-12 SEEK Funding

#### Fact Sheets: States With Biggest K-12 Funding Cuts

At least 31 states provided less state funding per student in the 2014 school year than in the 2008 school year, before the recession took hold. This map shows the ten states with the biggest cuts. Click on a state to see its fact sheet.



Kentucky had 6<sup>th</sup> highest cuts in the US (2014)




# K-12 SEEK Funding

#### State funding per student down by one-eighth

Kentucky state funding per student fell by 12.1 percent between 2008 and 2014. Only nine states imposed larger cuts.

Change in state K-12 funding per student relative to 2008, adjusted for inflation



Local governments in Kentucky raised school funding over the same period, but not by enough to fully offset the state cut. **Total state and local school funding combined fell by 7.0 percent** per student between 2008 and 2014.


Change in state and local K-12 funding per student relative to 2008, adjusted for inflation



Kentucky's "general" or "formula" funding per student — the primary form of state funding for schools — fell by 0.2 percent this year and is **10.6 percent below the 2008 level** due to earlier cuts.



# Cost of Higher Education Shifting from State to Students






### Many Other Areas Cut Deeply Since 2008

- Environmental protection 27%

- Commission on Human Rights, Women 19%, 25%
- Nature Preserves Commission, 23%
- Public health 15%
- Public defenders 13%





# We Have Less Than We Did General Fund Eroding Relative to Economy








### **KY Losing More to General Fund Tax Breaks** than Collecting in General Fund Revenue





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
## Fix an Upside Down Tax Code






### State and Local Taxes Are Upside Down

## Those at the Bottom Pay More as a Share of Family Income Than Those at the Top






# Top 1% Took Home All Real Income Growth Over Last 3.5 Decades in Kentucky
